Everyone in Australia must participate in the Census on 9 August. You can fill in the paper form or complete eCensus online.

eCensus is fast, secure and easy. A Census Collector will deliver eCensus materials to your home, but won't need to come back if you use eCensus.

The data collected is used by Government, industry and community groups to plan for the future and allocate services, facilities and funding in local communities.

I urge every household to cooperate with census collectors and either complete the hard copies handed to you or complete the forms on line at www.census.gov.au



The next Census of Population and Housing is just around the corner

(Tuesday 9 August) and Census Area Supervisor in the Rowville Area, Emanuele Cicchiello, is a strong supporter of the Census and of the benefits it has for the community.

Mr Cicchiello said "ensuring the Census is properly undertaken will enable local, state and federal governments to make good decisions when it comes to planning community infrastructure like parks, schools and child & maternal health services, which in my case is something that's very important at this stage of my families life".

"I was mayor in 2004 and the information collected formed much of the evidence on which we based our community planning decisions. This was particularly important in the growth area of Rowville and Lysterfield where there was a great need to plan for future growth including parks, sports and recreational facilities"said Emanuele.

He added, "the Census is the simplest way you can help the local authorities plan for a successful community. The statistics collected will provide vital information to make informed decisions. The Census is part of our responsibility as citizens and proud Australians".

So when you complete your Census form on 9 August, make sure you complete it as accurately as possible and return it to your Collector. Or you can complete your Census online via eCensus using the unique code which your Collector gives you. This means a Collector will not need to return to your home to collect your Census form. Mr Cicchiello urged people in the area to "do your bit

KNOX SAFER COMMUNITY GROUP The motive is the message

Motive for crime just became a lot more important to Victoria Police in their efforts to keep our streets safe. Victorian legislation has sharpened penalties for Prejudice Motivated Crime (PMC). The community is being encouraged to report incidents and the police alerted to recognise and respond appropriately.

PMC incidents are crimes, against property or persons, that are motivated by prejudices about race, religion, gender identity, age, sexual orientation, disability, homelessness etc. Previously many such incidents, especially in workplaces and at community events, went unreported.

PMC sends a message to the victim's entire group that they do not belong and that as individual members of the group, they could also be targeted. This causes the group to feel frightened and intimidated and erodes perceptions of safety. If you have ever been burgled you will remember suffering shock, loss and subsequent insecurity. But you didn't have to take it personally. Imagine how much worse

if you or your property are attacked for who you are. In our multicultural society everyone has a right to be treated with dignity and respect.



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Gas Heater Discount for Concession Card Holders Introduced

Heating accounts for approximately 50% of total energy used in Victorian homes. By replacing your electric heater with a high efficiency gas space heater, your household can reduce your power bills by up to \$280 per while saving up to 2 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions per year. The Victorian Government is making it more affordable for eligible Victorian households to make the switch to high efficiency gas space heaters, reduce household electricity bills and live more comfortably in winter.

This discount is a **\$700 point-of-sale** discount off the **full supply and installation costs** of a gas space heater. Ducted gas heating systems and unfillued heaters are not eligible for the discount.

It is available to eligible concession card holders who switch from a portable electric heater to an eligible high efficiency gas heater with an energy star rating of 4 or above. The discount is not available for the replacement of existing gas heating.

When contacting a participating supplier you should have with you:

Contributing to RLC News **Style Guide**

Publication Style

The Rowville Lysterfield Community News has its own style and your article will be made to fit with that style.

Formatting Your Contribution

The old saying that "Less is More" should be hung above your computer. Don't try to 'suggest' styles by cleverly formatting your article. Use simple fonts such as Times New Roman for text and Arial for headings). Many fonts cannot be embedded in a PDF document for electronic transmission to the printer.

Headings

Like most newspapers and magazines, we use Title Case for most headings, not all UPPERCASE.

Lines, Boxes and Spacing

Horizontal lines, boxes, extra spaces between paragraphs and manual line breaks (shades of a manual typewriter!) also have to be removed before I set your article.

Graphics

DO NOT insert your graphics in your Word document. Attach them to your email as separate files. Try to include the article title or name of subject in the graphic's name. Size and clarity of graphics is important. We use 300dpi resolution for photos while most scanners use 72dpi as their default. This is about $1/16^{th}$ the sharpness. The real figure to go by is the pixel width of the picture. As a rule of thumb – a picture will ideally be about 1000 pixels wide for a single column width. (About 1Mb)

Send as JPG files to keep the size reasonable. If the picture is under 100kb in size then it is probably lacking in detail and clarity, no matter how it looks on your screen.

An Invitation to Join the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Journey at Rowville Primary School

Rowville Primary School was recently very fortunate to be a successful recipient of a grant for the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Program. This is a program that first began at Collingwood College in inner city Melbourne in 2001. The program teaches students to grow, harvest, prepare and share fresh seasonal food.

We believe that by involving our students in a project such as this we are providing an authentic context for our students to learn about sustainable living and care for the environment. We have had a vegetable garden at Rowville



Primary School for several years and our students this year have participated in a timetabled garden session. We want to deepen the focus of the garden program next year and we want to link the garden more explicitly with a cooking program. The garden program will have a science/sustainability learning focus and the cooking program will occur in Italian.

The vision is to develop the entire area in the Simon Avenue section of the school (the current mud patch) into a productive garden. The area will include chooks, fruit trees and vegetables. We want our students to

learn to embrace the concepts of sustainability through cultivating fruit and vegetables and harvesting and preparing these in the kitchen too.

Students will learn that composting is a sustainable process for recycling waste. They will learn that growth can be enhanced without the use of artificial chemicals or fertilisers. They will also learn about food production by growing plants from seeds. Once the garden is productive they will learn how to prepare the food that they have grown. They will share the prepared meal with their class.

A garden team has formed to develop the "bare bones" of a garden plan. The members include Angela Vetsicas, Sue Reynolds, Heather Brown and Stewart Brown. There is infrastructure work currently taking place to build a kitchen in the new BER building. The goal is to have a section of the garden producing and for the kitchen to be complete by the end of the year. An acre has been set aside for the kitchen/garden which will evolve over several years.

The program also operates on goodwill and donations from the local community. It is a program that brings the community into the school. As the garden becomes more productive we envisage that members of the local community will assist to maintain the garden during term breaks and in return will be able to harvest fruit, vegetables or eggs to share with their own family.

We invite members of our school and local community

to join us on the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden journey. Are there members of the local community who are prepared to share their skills or are able to source donations? Do we have somebody who can supply concreting or provide physical labour or equipment to carry out the earthworks for the garden or is able to donate joinery for our kitchen or is able to donate building materials for the garden or the chook shed or a water tank? Are there any retired market gardeners in the community who would be willing to share their knowledge and skill? Is there anyone prepared to donate kitchen appliances?

Knox Council Housing Affordability

The great Australian dream of home ownership is becoming more difficult for people trying to break into Melbourne's housing market.

Knox's Affordable Housing Reference Group Chair Councillor Mick Van de Vreede is shocked at results from the Demographia International Housing Affordability Survey, which ranked Melbourne the 321st most affordable city out of 325 locations in Australia, Canada, Ireland, New Zealand, UK, USA and Hong Kong. That's a dubious honour for Victoria's capital if ever I've heard one," Cr Van de Vreede said. "It goes to show how unaffordable Melbourne has become and that's a problem for all of us.

Cr Van de Vreede said that government needed to act on solutions that should include increasing the supply of social housing for people on low incomes and pushing for greater integration of social housing into established neighbourhoods, and could include inclusionary zoning.

Cr Van de Vreede said. "Housing prices are being driven upwards at an alarming rate and everyday Australians are being put out of the housing market." The median house price in Knox has almost doubled in less than a decade, jumping by 88%. Furthermore, 30% of Knox renters spend more than 30% of their income on rent, while 11% of homeowners spend more than 30% of their income on mortgage repayments. The median housing price to income ratio in Melbourne is now 9:1 not long ago it was 6:1. A ratio of 3:1 is seen as an acceptable affordability ratio. Cr Van de Vreede concluded that "More affordable



housing in Knox and Melbourne generally is not a 'nice to have', it's an absolute necessity."

"Places such as greater London, Vancouver, Toronto all experience high ratios of housing cost to income. But perhaps most remarkable has been the shift in Australia, once the exemplar of modestly priced, high quality middle class housing, to now the most unaffordable housing market in the English speaking world."



We all love taking photos of family and friends to record occasions, functions or outings.

But, how many times are the photos just of a person or group of people directly facing the camera in fairly stiff pose with them visibly and self-consciously smiling as the photographer taking the photo says, "smile!"

People photography is mostly about facial expression and trying to capture the 'character' of the people. I find it works best if the people are engaged in an activity or concentrating on something they enjoy, as it takes their focus away from the camera and you.

As people are not as still as in the old style "smile" photos mentioned above, you may want to increase your shutter speed to freeze any slight movement. Doing this also widens your aperture. This is sometimes beneficial in slightly blurring a distracting or unattractive background and helps viewers concentrate on the people.

Take a number of successive photos of the scene so you can sort through them later to end up with one that best highlights the people and their facial expressions and character.

With the old film cameras you generally limited the number of photos you took, but with a digital camera you can take plenty of photos as there is no cost when you just delete the unsuitable ones.

The key to many successful 'people' photos is ensuring you include the eyes, so try to avoid shadows on the eyes. This means focusing your camera when possible on the

HINT: Try to have the person, or people, focussed and involved in something other than the camera.

"All that residents have to do is download the app from the Woolworths website and when they see an abandoned trolley, they simply open the app and the GPS tracker within their phone will report the location of the trolley to Woolworths.

Year Old Kindergarten

In the last few weeks of Term 2, we moved many of our usual activities around and presented them in a different manner. One example of this was the use of the easels. Rather than painting at them, we offered the children a variety of pasting



materials, scissors, paste and textas. By combining the two activities as well as using large sheets of backing paper, we noticed that many of the children remained focused and involved in their art work for longer. This experience provided opportunities to continue to challenge our fine motor skills as we adjusted the angle of our wrists to draw on a vertical rather than a horizontal plane. Also, the use of scissors allowed the children to alter the size and shape of items that they pasted onto the paper. It provided opportunities for the children to extend upon their ideas and explore their creativity as they experimented with the colours and textures of the materials available.

We also continued the use of natural materials by exploring the textures and properties of wet clay. The children moulded and shaped it with their hands, as well as using sculpting tools, hammers and wooden stampers to create patterns and textures and to alter the shape of the clay as they worked. For some children this was a very soothing experience where they satisfied their need for messy sensory play or to pound the clay using fists and mallets to release excess energy.

At Liberty Avenue Three Year Old Kindergarten, we currently offer two different groups, each with a maximum of 20 children in attendance. Our Gumnut group is a "deferred" group, specifically for children whose attendance at 4-year-old preschool has been deferred for a year, allowing the children more time to mature before going to school. This group attends for 2 x 3hr sessions per week. Our Bottlebrush group attends for 2 x 2.5hr sessions per week. The costs vary according to group preference.

We employ two staff members, including a qualified kindergarten teacher and an assistant. We pride ourselves in offering families an individually based programme, where the children's progress is monitored and their needs are planned for on an individual basis. Dry Eye usually occurs due to destruction of the tear glands by the dog's own immune system, resulting in no tears being produced. Dry Eye is an incredibly painful disease that requires ongoing treatment to prevent irritation, infection, and ultimately blindness.

To understand the pain your dog may be suffering, hold your own eye open for a minute without blinking. The dry, irritated feeling is what they constantly feel. Blinking further increases the irritation and pain.

Symptoms to look out for are: Rubbing/scratching eyes, Red and inflamed eyes, Discharge from eyes, Dry or cloudy looking eyes, Frequent eye infections, Excessive blinking or keeping eyes closed

Dry Eye can occur in all dogs. Older dogs and the breeds in the following list are more prone to this painful condition: Most Spaniel breeds, West Highland White Terriers, Shih Tzus, Pekingese, Lhasa Apsos, Yorkshire Terriers, Pugs, Shar Peis, Poodles and Bulldogs.

Older dogs, or those who have diabetes, or recurring eye infections may also suffer from Dry Eve disease.





Students Corner

The following essay considers the question of free will. Most of us assume that when asked to choose between Corn Flakes and Coco Pops, we weigh up the pros and cons then make a decision. But is it really our decision, or has it already been decided, and we are just fulfilling a destiny? Is free will just an illusion?

The society that we live in is based on certain assumptions about free will, in numerous aspects. The assumption of a person's free will is most prominently applied in the legal system, where it is assumed that a person who committed a crime did it of their own free will, and that it was not set out for them and unavoidable. Another is seen in literature and mythology, where the assumption of free will is necessary in order to understand the role of the protagonist. However, even though free will is assumed in everyday life during this day, there was a time when free will was not assumed, which will also be explored briefly.

Our legal system is based on the concept that a person who has committed a crime did so upon their own free will, and it was not an unavoidable event set out for them by a god or spiritual deity. It holds people responsible for voluntary actions and their results. If free will were not assumed in this situation, perhaps a murderer would not be punished for their crime, as it was set out for them to do so, and they never had the choice in the matter. Additionally, the legal system also

determines circumstances whereby someone was not of 'sound mind' when they committed a crime, and therefore were not in a situation where they had control over their choices and actions. The assumption of free will in the legal system can be seen as one of the most important, as not only does it ensure the punishment and justice (in most cases), but it also protects the free will of others by keeping them safe. This example is directly associated with 'Determinism and Responsibility'. This theory says that if the world is deterministic and all actions and events are pre-determined, then people could not take responsibility for their actions, as they could argue that they had no choice in the matter.

Another aspect of free will in society is in literature and mythology. Here, free will is assumed, for if it were not, how could the notion of a hero begin to be conceived if their choices and decisions never affected the final outcome. How could one even begin to feel for the protagonist in a novel, if no matter what actions they took, the outcome would always be there. How could you feel the sense of dislike for Lord Voldemort in the Harry Potter series, if everything was set out for him from the start, and he had no control over the villain he became. Without the assumption of free will, it is almost impossible to create a believable, or interesting storyline, or to follow mythology.

Finally, in the past, the assumption of free will has not always been made by people of society. During the 1700's in France, the monarchy had such control over the nation, that the people were not aware that they had the right to make their own decisions. The slogan of the revolutionaries in 1789 was 'Liberty, Equality, Fraternity' with 'Liberty' being the right to do as they pleased, as

long as it did not endanger the free will of others. The right to free will was also outlined in 'The Declaration of the Rights of Man and Citizen'. Although it was not a legal document, it changed society as the people became aware that they had the right to free will, could talk about what they pleased and publish what they wanted. In the sense of free will in society, the 1700's saw the beginning of the realisation of the right to free will across Europe, establishing governing systems and social reforms which are still acted upon to this day.

Personally, although I believe in the theory of compatalism, which claims that our decisions are casually determined and we have the illusion of free will, the theory that can best be compared to the assumption of free will in society is 'determinism and responsibility'. As mentioned previously, the theory suggests that if everything were pre-determined, how could anybody be praised or punished for their actions? This applies to the examples of the legal system, and also literature and mythology. The theory of 'indeterminism', which states that events happen randomly by chance, supports all three examples to an extent. This is because indeterminism is essentially the assumption of complete free will, which supports the idea that a criminal robbed a bank because they chose to, a hero saved a baby from a burning building because it was their choice, and that people in society had the right to free will, to make their own choices.


Conclusively, it can be safely said that if free will were not assumed in society, the world we are currently living in would be completely different. These assumptions shape what we read, who governs us, and how safe we are. They also give us the freedom and right to publish and speak about what we please without oppression, and that to have a balanced, fair, and lawful society, it is necessary to assume free will.

The hamstrings are a group of muscles found at the back of the leg between the bottom and knee. Hamstring strains

are very common injuries sustained by active people and are commonly the result of high intensity actions such as running, kicking, jumping and dancing, though can also occur in activities such as yoga.

Like any muscular strain hamstring strains can be classified from a scale of 1 to 3 with 3 being more severe. Classifications are based on the size of the area of muscle affected and the resulting changes in the muscles performance, in combination with pain levels. This classification is something best performed by a physiotherapist.

Treatment of strains is similar to any other muscle injury. As soon as possible rest from activity and apply ice to the area, using a compression bandage and elevating the affected limb. A physiotherapist can then assess your strain and determine the best rehabilitation plan for you to get back to sport or your activity as soon as possible. This can include massage, stretching, strengthening and specific return to sport exercises dependent on the classification of your injury.

Some people can suffer from re-occurring hamstring injuries, this is one of the biggest conditions plaguing the AFL and other elite running sporting teams. In the case of re-occurring strains, other factors may be contributing including muscle imbalances, nerve issues, sporting or running technique concerns and bio-mechanical issues to name a few. Your physiotherapist is the best person to asses this and put you on an appropriate rehabilitation pathway.

Warts / Verrucae Pedis

Warts, also known as a "Verrucae Pedis" are areas of viral skin infection that are caused by "The Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) and are extremely common on the feet. There are many types of HPV virus and likewise verrucae come in all shapes and sizes.

Causes / Common places they are picked up:

Contact with someone else who has a wart / verrucae. Contact with a surface that a wart has been in contact

Public showers at the pool or gym (warm/moist enviorments)

Hotel carpets

Sharing shoes / Socks.

How can I tell if I have a Verrucae?

Hurt with direct pressue if large, over a bony prominence or pressure area.



Usually Hurt if squeezed gently side to side

Cauliflower appearance - surface of the verruca is often rough like a cauliflower

Little black areas / dots are visible within the verrucae.

These are small blood vessels





Here is a brief summary of items affecting the Rowville-Lysterfield area from the Knox City Council meeting on the 28^{th} of June 2011.

ITEM 6.4 Stud Park (Stage 2) Structure Plan Review

A report was presented to Council in response to a Call Up item from the council meeting on the 31 May 2011 requesting a report on the indicative process, timing and resources requirements to review the Stud Park Structure Plan (Stage 2) as resolved by Council on 27 April 2011. The report highlights the relationship with the housing policy review project and the need to advance the housing policy review project to better understand the implications and directions for the review of the Structure Plan - in the context of the strategic approach to planning and managing housing change across Knox. The review is expected to take approximately two years to complete and cost approximately \$350,000. This cost estimate includes the costs for a full time senior project manager for 18 months. The report recommends that the review does not commence until the direction of the housing policy review is confirmed; and refer the resource and budget requirements to the 2011/12 midyear budget review.

Council resolved to:

- 1. Note the report outlining an indicative project scope (as per Appendix A) to review the Stud Park (Stage 2) Structure Plan as resolved by Council on 27 April 2011.
- 2. Refer the detailed project scope to the next available meeting of the Housing Advisory Committee for consideration and comment and then to the August 2011 issues Briefing meeting for further consideration.
- 3. Refer resource and budget requirements (\$190,000) to commence the review of the Stud Park Structure Plan to the 2011/12 midyear budget review and further resource and budget requirements to complete the process to the

2012/13 budget process.

- 4. Subject to the outcome of mid year budget consideration; commence a review of the Stud Park Structure Plan in November 2011 after first reviewing Council's Housing Policy direction.
- 5. Subject to the outcome of mid year budget considerations, undertake a cumulative traffic and on-street car parking impact assessment and cumulative drainage impact assessment for the Substantial and Moderate Change areas as part of the review process and in time to inform draft changes to the Structure Plan (Stage 2).
- 6. Initiate an Expression of Interest process with a view to establishing a 'Community Reference Group' to assist with the proposed review of the Stud Park Structure Plan (stage 2), recognising that the finalisation of this process and appointments will be subject to the outcome of the mid year budget considerations.

Item 10.2 Works Report as at 14 June 2011 Stamford Park Redevelopment

The Procurement Options Report prepared by AECOM Consultants has been considered at the May Council Issues Briefing and feedback received. A report formally recommending the preferred procurement option will be presented to Council in July 2011. The Minister for Planning has authorised Council to exhibit the Planning Scheme Amendment (C93) for Stamford Park. Discussions are continuing with Melbourne Water regarding flood issues at Stamford Park and the surrounding residential area

Corhanwarrabul Creek Trail (To Dandenong Creek) – Shared path

Majority of shared path works at Stamford Park along Kelletts Road main drain and Stud Road are now complete.

Stud Road, Rowville – Sunshine Street to Timbertop Drive – Footpath

The developer is building a front fence and once completed, this will become the new title boundary. The developer's surveyor will draw up the necessary title documents.

Wellington Road, Rowville – Smartbus Footpath Connection

Works have been completed.

Eildon Park Storm Water Harvesting – Stage 2 Tanks to be installed on June 18.

Avalon/Stamford/Stud Road Intersection

Gambling your house away

As an MP, you sometimes get constituents in your office whose stories blow your mind and set you on a course you never expected.

This was the case when a young, unemployed Wantirna man came to see me in early March. The young man was given \$80,000 in credit by the online gambling company, Sportsbet.com.au. Over the course of a week, he blew it all. Sportsbet have since taken him to court, bankrupted him and he is about to lose his family home that he shares

with his mother.

When he first told me this story, I was surprised that gambling companies were legally able to give credit to their customers for the purposes of gambling. It did not seem right. There is too much of a conflict of interest, and too much risk for problem gamblers to lose everything.

I have since discovered that most jurisdictions in Australia do indeed restrict online gambling companies acting as lenders. But the Northern Territory does not. Guess where all the major online gambling companies, such as Sportsbet, are licensed?

I am not anti-gambling as such. I enjoy a flutter as much as the next person. But I think it is morally bankrupt, and dangerous, for online gambling companies to give credit to their customers so that they can (literally) bet their house away without leaving their living room. It is one thing to lose everything in your savings account, but it is a different matter entirely to be put tens of thousands into debt.

I have asked the Northern Territory Chief Minister to change the NT laws. If he fails to do so, then I will seek to get the Federal Parliament to address this loophole.

As for the young Wantirna man, we are still fighting his case, but it is not looking good. I have asked the CEO of Sportsbet to show compassion. After all, the company suffered no or little cash loss.

I fear, however, that my request is landing on deaf ears.

Knox Council and Victoria Police need your help to catch taggers who are intent on vandalising our community. At the moment, Council and Police are hot on the trail of several taggers. They're asking residents to look out for the tags, CREEP, WESK, RATES, AROZE, KAWT and REDMAN.

"Last year Council and local Police started using a graffiti database which records instances of graffiti in Knox," Cr Gill, Chair of the Graffiti and Vandalism Committee explained. "This helps Police and Knox Council collect images of graffiti, and helps Police build an evidence portfolio to assist in charging offenders. Residents can help Police and Council by reporting any graffiti they see, particularly the tags mentioned above and after taking a photograph of the graffiti log onto Council's website www. knox.vic.gov.au and record details of the graffiti through the graffiti reporting tool."

Knox Police Senior Sergeant Phil Edmunds said community assistance was essential in identifying offenders. "The more residents and businesses that come forward with information and images of graffiti, the better chance we have of catching these taggers. We're also likely to have more evidence, which can result in increased penalties handed out through the courts. Graffiti offenders are targeting both private and public property in Knox, with no discrimination. We want these people to be held accountable for their actions."

Cr Gill said residents should remove graffiti on their own properties after photographing, as quick removal can help discourage repeat offences. Residents can call Council on 9298 8000 to request a graffiti removal kit. Anyone with information about the identity of graffiti taggers should contact CrimeStoppers on 1800 333 000 or Knox Police on 9881 7000.

An Hour With Councillor **Darren Pearce**

When incumbent councillor Tony Kimitsis advised that

he wasn't going to contest the next council elections in 2007 the road to council chambers began for Darren Pearce.

Darren was born in Newcastle NSW, 46 years ago, where his father was an engineer with BHP, but in 1974, his father gained a promotion and the family moved to Melbourne, settling in Wheelers Hill.

Darren attended Wheelers Hill Primary School and Brentwood Secondary College before going on to tertiary studies at Monash University where he gained a Bachelor of Economics in Business Administration.

After graduation, Darren took up a post as a supermarket manager with one of the biggest retailers but quickly realised that this wasn't the path for him. He travelled to the UK and Europe for a year and enjoyed the experience and different cultures. However, Australia was home and on his return in the middle of the 1991 "recession we had to have" he tried the supermarket business in Sydney, but was disillusioned and decided to further his education at the University of Technology in Sydney where he achieved a Graduate Certificate in Accounting. It was also whilst studying there that he met his wife to be Susan, and they married in 1996. "I was working in sales as an account manager for a tax & legal publishing company at the time, so I enrolled at the Graduate School of Business at Macquarie University and in 2002 I gained my Master of Business Administration in Marketing" says Darren.

Later that same year the couple moved to Melbourne and bought the house they live in today in Rowville. The couple have two children, daughter Courtney 8 who attends Heany Park Primary School and son Simon 4, who attends Liberty Avenue Pre-School. Susan runs her own accounting business from home, specialising in auditing self managed super funds.

After his experience for the publishing company and then as a Senior Consultant in the business supplies and equipment industry, Darren decided to start his own small business consultancy, advising and training people on how to start and run their own businesses. He has successfully built this up over the last 8 years, but "between my

business and my commitment as a councillor there is not much time for outside activities" he says. "However, I am proud to be the Director of Finance for the Ferntree Gully and Rowville Financial Services Ltd and I get to see my favourite football team Geelong as often as I can".

Darren admits that he 'lacked athletic ability' at school and was a bit of a nerd especially as he preferred to be in the school chess team rather than play one of the football codes. He adds "But I still have a passion to help people and I greatly admire Michael Gerber, especially his book "The E-Myth Revisited" where the author attempts to answer the question 'Why Most Small Businesses Don't Work And What To Do About It'".

I asked Darren what drove him to stand as a councillor, as there was no family history of government involvement of any kind, although his mother and father certainly followed

and understood the political scene of their time. "When I read about the proposed 17% rate increases in 2004, I thought how unfair that was on households and that the load could be better spread across business and private households. This was my first inkling of wanting to serve the community" he says. Since 2008, Darren has served alongside three Mayors, David Cooper, who Darren describes as consultative with good mediating skills, Joe Cossari who held strong views and ideas and finally Sue McMillan who is totally dedicated to the role.

In answer to the question about the best and worst aspects of his role, Darren was quick to say that the opportunity to help residents and improve their quality of life is the most rewarding. Conversely, whilst the nine councillors mostly agree on what is best for the municipality, some things don't always get done to individual councillors total satisfaction and sometimes we haven't the power to help residents directly as their problems are either a State or Federal Government issue.

When I eventually retire as a councillor I would like to think that the residents I represent will remember me as someone who honoured every election commitment. The most important issue for the future is the planning and development of the City surrounding the future of medium and high density development, I hope to continue to be sitting in council after the 2012 elections to represent my ward residents.

One of the Councillor's edicts is, *intelligence x ignorance* = *arrogance*. There is certainly none of the latter on show here.



houses and shops to keep away evil."



What's Happening at Heany Park Grade Four






Youth!
