

# From the Editor's Desk



The SES were once again called into action last month as torrential rain hit Lysterfield and Rowville. Dandenong Creek rose to 4.7 metres, high enough for a potential flood warning to be issued to Rowville residents and major roads were closed. There were also reports of sightings of snakes. These SES volunteers who give up their time to help affected

residents, be it flood, fire or hail, deserve a huge 'thanks' from all residents even if you were not affected this time. Personally, I think they deserve a long rest.

So the argument over the Stud Rd bus lanes goes on, with a promise of a resolution by the end of March. Scoresby MP Kim Wells has suggested adding another lane and retaining the bus lanes, but the Public Transport Users Association prefer the much less costly alternative of making the bus lane available to taxis and cars with three or more passengers (T3). Mr Wells responded by saying that people expect the State Government to abide by their commitment to remove the bus lanes. On top of this, March 10<sup>th</sup> is the deadline for the election promise of a feasibility study for the Rowville rail project. If it wasn't such an important issue it would be farcical.

The issue of 'hoons' in suburban streets came to the fore again. Taylor Ward Councillor, Darren Pearce said he had received complaints about speeding in several local streets, especially around Anthony Drive in Lysterfield as well as Heany Park Rd and Pitfield Cres in Rowville. If you see 'hoon' activity it is your responsibility to report it to police before there is a serious accident and possibly loss of life.

There are a large number of events happening this month (see the Events Calendar) but I urge you all not to miss the Knox Festival on 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> and to make the effort to go into the City for Moomba. Don't forget too, the big 'Clean Up' days, business, school and community. Be proud of your surrounding and our Country. For those who need an adrenalin rush you could do worse than the Air Show at Avalon from the 4<sup>th</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup>.

You will also read in this issue the plight of the Apex Club of Rowville. If you have the desire to help out in the community give them a call. They will be delighted to explain their aims and activities and welcome you into their club.

If you enjoy a good laugh then have a go at our invitation to win tickets to the Comedy Club. A joke or funny story could win you a night of hilarity at Knox Ozone, with some of our funniest comedians.

solution by reporting it to Council. Best of all, you can now report it online. Graffiti and Vandalism Committee Chair, Councillor Adam Gill, said "The new Council web feature, which also enables photo uploads, would support Council's efforts to clean up graffiti on private, public and its own properties quickly and assist Police in their efforts to catch taggers, as well as keeping Knox tidy". Cr Gill suggested residents should also call their local Police station if they noticed graffiti on their own property. "There are three Police officers throughout Knox who are dedicated coordinators for using this database, which records all graffiti, pinpoints areas that are being targeted the most and identifies which "taggers" are most actively defacing property in Knox" Cr Gill said. "Each year, we have a number of requests relating to removal of graffiti, now, residents can report online through a great new graffiti reporting service, which can be found

on Council's website, www.knox.vic.gov.au under the 'online services' side tab, and then through 'online service requests'.

"Council is empowering the community to take action and help Police catch vandals," Cr Gill added. While Council doesn't clean graffiti from private property, Council can assist residents and businesses by providing a graffiti cleanup kit or discounted paint. Residents can call Council on 9298 8000 for more information about these kits.

# Live, Learn & Have Fun Whilst Helping Others

Apex Australia is a vibrant and energetic volunteer service organisation, focussed on harnessing the ideas, ideals and intelligence of younger Australians aged 18 to 45. The Apex story is one of fun, fellowship and friendship that offers the opportunity to give others a fair go, practical help and positive role models to reach their own potential.

The first Apex club started in Geelong in 1931, as a result of three architects trying to join another service club but being refused due to their restrictions. The familiar Apex triangular emblem was soon seen in many country towns and is today one of the most recognisable symbols in Australia. Since its inception, more than 200,000 younger Australians have learnt key skills whilst making a practical contribution to the common good. Apex is neither sectarian nor party political and whilst Apex is authentically Australian it also supports initiatives to help our regional neighbours.

At the heart of Apex is our clubs, such as the Rowville one, a group of focussed volunteers that take their responsibilities seriously and take pride in helping their community. There are approximately 350 clubs nationally and the Rowville club has been in existence since 1976. Apex Club membership was until the 1990's male only, but today it includes both genders in the 18 to 45 age group. After 45, ex members can become Senior Active, wherein

they can still offer their expertise and time, whilst not being a fully fledged member. There is also an Apex Youth scheme being introduced that is school based and is open to 14 to 18 year olds.

Throughout its history Apex has always shown a preparedness to tackle the problems of the day, without forgetting those issues and social problems that are not high profile or fashionable. In the 1930's Apex helped the Royal Flying Doctor Service with equipment and pioneered the introduction of free milk to Australian school children. In the next decade they succeeded in a compulsory tuberculosis Xray testing scheme and in the 1950's established the first Guide Dogs for the Blind training centre. In the following decades they have raised substantial funds for Autism. supported MS education, aided the creation of the SIDS Foundation and established the Robert Stoltz Scolarship to the Vienna Conservatorium of Music, as well as raising over \$4 million for life education in Primary Schools, regarding substance abuse and donating more than \$1 million to the Westmead Children's Hospital.

Today Apex undertakes a range of activities aimed at youth, including an all States public speaking competition and holding a national debating final at their July national convention. The Teenage Fashion Awards are also run by Apex, with the top three contestants in each State contesting the national final in October each year.

Apex Rowville was born in 1976 with 28 members although in the last 10 years it has struggled to keep membership in double figures. As part of the bi centennial celebrations they received a Government grant to host "Party At The Gardens", which involved taking over the whole of the Caribbean Gardens complex for a day. In 2005 as part of the Centenary of Rowville the club arranged a sale of "Centenary Wines and Wine Glasses" that culminated

with a Black Tie Ball at the Community Centre. In addition the club has provided over 1,000 hours of community service per annum, assisted the Bonnie Babes Foundation in various projects including Mother of the Year and National Babies Day awards and offered enormous support to the "burn Rubba for Bubba" at Calder Park Raceway. Apex Rowville co-ordinated the delivery and staffing of a BBQ trailer at the Kinglake Evacuation Centre. They also took up 2 trucks of firewood (!) and donated 65 bikes into the region. For the last two years they have co-ordinated other clubs for the Yooralla "Great Vic Trek" which has helped raise over \$600,000. This year they will once again be responsible for the Oppy Bike Ride on 6th March at the Knox Festival and continue their wholehearted support of the Stringybark Festival in October.

Apex Clubs of Australia has come a long way since John Buchan, Ewan Laird and Langham Proud founded the organisation 80 years ago.

The Apex Club of Rowville is always ready to welcome new members. They meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays each month at the Stamford Hotel, 7pm for a 7.30pm start. ## Rowville Neighbourhood Watch closes. And a new system starts-

Neighbourhood watch was launched on 18th May 1987 in Rowville comprising of 4 areas, which was the result of Michael Walters and others door knocking to get support.

Initially the area was known as Y91 and Y92 and in 1990 was renamed Foxtrot 54,55,56 and 57. F54 and F57 closed some years later and in June 2005 F55 and F56 combined to becoming known as KNX 28 and KNX29. At the start of NHW, 1000 community newsletters were being distributed in the area and by 2010 it had risen to 3000. Over 23 years, 241 newsletters have been produced

and are being preserved. Our newsletters received state awards numerous times.

Many community programs were conducted and the crime statistics reduced when comparing 1000 homes to 3000 homes with current crime trends. Rowville Neighbourhood Watch had a very good relationship with our police officers, who attended the meetings conducting many NHW programs in partnership. With the change in police leadership and pressure on young families, it was becoming difficult to replace area representatives who had moved out of the area.

The long drawn out change to NHW and police unable to attend meetings and unable to provide crime statistics for publication in the newsletters brought much unrest within the community. Rowville NHW managed to keep producing newsletters until 2010.

A new system called Police Service Area (PSA) has been started within the Knox area. All interested residents are able to participate in this new system.

I would like to thank all the zone representatives over the 23 years which NHW operated and our many sponsors for their support and for the many police officers who gave their own time.





FIELDS or Friends Interested in the Environment of Lysterfield and the Development of Services was formed to take a stand on local issues. Does anyone recall anything about the group? The first stage development plan was submitted for the whole of the Seebeck property to the west of Taylors Lane. As each allotment was more than 725sq m, a 5% open space contribution was applicable (=1.6 ha reserve) together with the 1.8% widening requirements to Taylors Lane. Council applied to the RCA for \$18,000 to re-surface Stud Rd from Police Rd to Dandenong Creek and \$1.75m for the duplication of Stud Rd from FTG Rd to Dandenong Creek.

#### 1991

The Apex club held a 'Billy Cart' derby at the Community Centre and apparently the track was worth coming to see. Can anyone remember it or better still show us a photo? The clubhouse at Churchill Park Golf Course was destroyed by fire. Council granted McDonalds Australia Pty Ltd permission to construct a restaurant and medical centre on the corner of Stud and Fulham Rds. Fast food had arrived as KFC came to Rowville the previous


December. Rowville Seniors were excited about the closing attraction of Senior Citizens Week, a "Re-cycled Teenagers Debutante Ball". Who can tell us more about that? John E Sutton was ordained as the first full time Minister of the Rowville Church of Christ and Leigh Scanlan became the new Principal of St Simons Primary School. John Lucas and Alan Runting won the Australian Fireball Championship in their 16ft yacht "No Second Prize" and set their sights on the World Championships in Sweden. Did you make it boys?

#### 1996

The Eastern Campus of Rowville Secondary College was opened with College Principal Ian Linnett and Eastern Campus Principal Anne Coughlin helping to plant trees in the grounds. Under the auspices of Joan Pepi the inaugural meeting of the Rowville Neighbourhood House Reference Group was well attended. Were you there? Excavation work began on the new Lysterfield Primary School but controversy arose over the future of the 120 year old buildings, the oldest institution in the district. What happened to the "unfinished steel structure" on the corner of Stud and Wellington Rds, that was to be a Basketball Centre?

#### 2001

TXU, an electricity provider, sold the Rowville Transmission Facility on the corner of Stud and Wellington Rds for \$30 million. I wonder what it is worth today? Knox Council invited local 'characters', particularly those in uniform, to appear in one of the numbers at their concert to celebrate the Centenary of Federation. No acting or singing required. Did you volunteer? Mayor Jenny Moore, along with over 300 other people, attended Rowville Baptist Church Centenary service, whilst Andrew Fuller spoke to an interested audience at the Uniting Church about schoolyard bullying. Did you attend either? Who can remember the Professional Championship Wrestling at the Community Centre?





#### 2006

The 1st Rowville Venturer Scouts canoed down the Yarra River at night, right into the centre of Melbourne, not something you do often. Were you one of them? As a result of increased staffing levels, Rowville Police Station was able to provide a 24 hour a day, 7 day a week response vehicle in the area. Tayla Kearns from Rowville Little Athletics won gold medals in the Girls Under 11, 100, 200 and 400 metres events and a silver in the 70 metres at the Eastern regional Championships. Do you still run Tayla? To coincide with the visit of the Volvo around the World Ocean Race yachts, the Australian Access Class Championships were held in Melbourne. The Access boats are specifically designed to accommodate people with different levels of physical and mental abilities. # **Bonnie Babes Founder Retires**

Having lost her first two unborn sons (she now has two healthy sons) former long time Rowville resident, Rachel Stanfield-Porter thought that other Mothers suffering the same emotional pain might get comfort and support by talking to others feeling the same grief and loss. So on Valentines Day 1994, the Bonnie Babes Foundation was created on Rachel's kitchen table, to provide support to families in Australia, when very little help was available from other sources.

With the help of Kim Wells, the current State Member for Scoresby, local businesses, service clubs and exposure in our own RLCN, Rachel was able to grow the Foundation and help more and more families. The Foundation, which is a non profit charity, raises awareness of the impact of stillbirths, miscarriages and pregnancy difficulties, whilst also providing grief counselling and assisting neonatal research through funding. Amongst their many achievements, the Foundation was instrumental in establishing a children's area at the Springvale Botanical Cemetery, which is overlooked by a huge bronze baby statue in honour of children lost during pregnancy and childbirth.

With the advent of the pregnancy, birth and baby hotline formed by the Government in 2010, the grief counselling arm of the Foundation has developed as a separate entity, The Small Miracles Foundation, leaving Bonnie Babes to concentrate on raising funds for research. A book of the same name written by Rachel is available in good bookshops.

I asked Rachel if she had one outstanding memory and she recalled "The poor lady who lost nine children but with our help and support tried one more time and gave birth to a healthy baby girl. That was a wonderful moment". She added "I couldn't have achieved anything without the help of our ambassadors, who give up their time to help others". One of these is Pinky McKay, who despite having a family life bringing up five children, being a nurse, a breastfeeding councillor, conducting on-line parenting and breastfeeding seminars and recently undertaking 'Baby Massage' with Danni Minogue, has written two books "Toddler Tactics' and 'Sleeping Like A Baby'. Her third offering, 'Parenting By Heart' was released at Chadstone Shopping Centre in mid February and all three books are available at department stores and all good bookshops. 

Last month, in preparation for the new U3A Knox term, Parkhills, U3A's home, became a much more "green" building with the installation of solar panels, which are part of a "smart roof" fan system. This installation will keep the building at an even 20–21 degrees winter and summer, minimising the use of air conditioning and gas heating. These will still be needed in extreme weather conditions, but the installation will save a great deal in utility costs.

As U3A Knox has on most days about 200 people through its doors (membership was over 1000 people at end of last year), such costs are a major consideration. More than 110 sessions per week are held in the building, some of which are being offered for the first time, a Knox Council building which has been U3A's home since 1996, and been upgraded twice in that time. People over 45 and retired from full time employment can become members, and

most members volunteer some service to the organisation to run it. We have a variety of subjects including Computer subjects (at a small extra cost), Languages, History, Speechcraft and Creative Writing.

Membership costs are only \$40 per year.

# **Dr Frank Whelan**


You don't have to be a school leaver, a junior sportsperson or a community minded youngster to be an achiever. Age is not a barrier to achievement as the following story illustrates.

Dr Frank Whelan at 53 years of age is a newcomer to the chiropractic profession, having gained his VCE in Chemistry in 2005 before qualifying as a chiropractor after completing the 5 year course at RMIT Bundoora, 3 months ago. The curriculum includes 4,200 hours of classroom, laboratory and clinical experience, of which 555 hours are devoted to learning about adjustive techniques and spinal analysis.

Frank started his working life with Safeway at Forrest Hill as a trolley boy before joining McEwen's (remember them?) and finally Mitre 10, where he worked for 20 years in various marketing and merchandise roles. He read an article in 2000 about a man who died on his 100th birthday, whilst his party was in full swing, and after Frank visited a chiropractor for a lower back pain, decided then that he wanted to live that long too and help others to reach that age as well. A resident of Wantirna South, Frank has a school teacher wife and two adult children (one in graphic design and one in HR) and has been at Wellness On Wellington since January 3rd.

I asked Frank what the most common complaint was and he said "They are mostly to do with the spine, from low back to neck but we deal with every bone and joint in the body".

Frank said that basically an adjusting table and his hands are his only tools, although he also uses an 'activator' for improved accuracy and precision. I suggested that with so few pieces of equipment the session charges seemed somewhat high, to which he replied "The cost of consultations is relatively low, especially when compared



to the results achieved. Private health insurance covers chiropractic and in certain cases Medicare refunds part or all of the costs. Remember too, that the public can come to us first, without visiting a doctor, although some patients do come with GP referrals".

Having suffered for many years at the hands of doubters and sceptics, Frank believes that "Chiropractic has now taken its rightful place in the health care community, which is evidenced by the inclusion of a chiropractor in an increasing number of medical centres".

Chiropractors are the spinal health experts, focussing on the relationship between the structure (primarily the spine) and the function, as co-ordinated by the nervous system and the scientific fact that the body is a self-regulating, self-healing organism. Chiropractors are Government registered and regulated. As a profession the primary belief is in natural and conservative methods of health care

A History of Chiropractic (from the Greek chiropraktikos

meaning 'done by hand')

Hippocrates advised: "Get knowledge of the spine, for this is the requisite for many diseases". Herodotus, a contemporary of Hippocrates would correct spinal abnormalities through manipulation of the patient's spine. The philosopher Aristotle was critical of Herodotus' tonic-free approach because, "he made old men young and thus prolonged their lives too greatly."

Chiropractic officially began in 1895 when Daniel David Palmer of Iowa performed the first chiropractic adjustment on a partially deaf janitor, who mentioned a few days later to Palmer that his hearing seemed better. This led Palmer to open a school of chiropractic two years later. Early chiropractic bore similarities to osteopathy and was criticized as practicing medicine without a license, which led to many chiropractors, including D.D. Palmer, being jailed.

For most of its existence, chiropractic has battled with mainstream medicine, but by the mid 1980s there was a growing scholarly interest in chiropractic, which helped efforts to improve service quality and establish clinical guidelines such as recommending manual therapies for acute low back pain.

# **Knox Council Storm Response**

Knox Council is working through a near record amount of calls for storm water assistance following the 1 in 100 year storm that swept across Victoria last weekend. Chief Executive Officer Graeme Emonson said Council had

received more than 250 requests for assistance during the weekend deluge and officers responded to a further 834 calls on Monday.

"Each of these requests was for assistance with managing storm water. Council has had staff working continuously since late on Friday responding to requests right across the city. Each of these requests are prioritised, with issues threatening roads or homes taking precedence over other requests" he said. Mr Emonson said Council crews had to close as many as 20 roads across Knox to help respond to flooding. He said that the number of calls to Council were almost on-par with levels seen immediately after the freak hailstorm that wreaked havoc across Knox in March 2010.

"Every request will be processed.
"We just ask that residents be patient as we respond to an unprecedented number of requests." Council is also working with Melbourne Water to identify water capacity issues and identify any blockages in the drainage system."

# Alam Tudge Writes

## **Rising Costs Hurt Families**

Residents of Rowville and Lysterfield enjoy a community and lifestyle to which many in Australia aspire. The houses are nice and generally well kept, there are quality schools and parks, and there is a strong community spirit.

Even in such a strong local community, thousands of individuals are currently doing it tough. In some instances this is due to the loss of a job, serious illness or addiction. But I am concerned that the financial strain is more widespread than this.

What I am hearing from many people in Knox, who might not normally contact their local Federal Member of Parliament, is that they are being deeply affected by increases in the cost of living. I am hearing this from retirees on fixed incomes, from busy families and from singles.

Their views are backed up by the statistics: electricity has risen 42% since 2007, gas prices are up 29%, water up 46%, with interest rates continuing to rise. Add to the list rising petrol and grocery costs. They are all going up faster than wages or the pension.

Danielle, a local mother, describes well the difficulty this is causing: "I am a single mother. Our mortgage rates are set to rise. Petrol prices are high. After I've allocated my money to bills I can afford to spend \$240 per week which has to cover food, petrol, any school excursions, clothing, shoes, entertainment, I can assure you, there's not much room for fun. I feel as though the government and big companies (gas, water, electricity) are taking everything they can. This financial pressure we're under takes the joy out of life.'

People are saving money where they can, and others, such as Bill and Dawn O'Neill from Waterford Park Retirement Village have taken measures such as removing half the lightbulbs in their living room in order to save on electricity. But some things we can't cut back on. Many of the goods and services that are rising in price so rapidly are essential items.

The Government does not directly control the prices



### National Multiple Birth Awareness Week: 13-20 March 2011

The Knox Multiple Birth Association Inc. is a not for profit community organisation which would not operate without the dedication of our volunteer members. Most committee members volunteer their time in order to give back some of the support that was offered when they were expecting their multiples. It is quite a daunting experience for some to find out that there is more than one heartbeat at that first ultrasound!

## Physiotherapy 9763 9233 **Anterior Knee** Pain in Adolescents

Anterior knee pain (or pain about the knee cap) is a very common condition that affects active teenagers. It is more common in boys than girls, and commonly presents between the ages of 9 and 16 and is linked with growth spurts. It is more common in those who play sports that involve lots of running and jumping such as football, basketball and netball and can be very frustrating and debilitating to the sufferer.

One cause of anterior knee pain is a condition known as Osgood Schlatter's disease where the athlete will complain of pain at the front of the knee of varying intensity that is often worse with activity. Osgood Schlatter's can be diagnosed in the physiotherapy clinic without the need for medical imaging.

Treatment of Osgood Schlatter's involves activity modification, stretching and strengthening exercises, and correction of abnormal biomechanics (e.g. flat feet). It is important to know that the condition can take between 6 to 12 months to fully recover. Surgery or injections are not effective for treating this problem. Some level of physical activity can continue as pain allows.

Not all anterior knee pain is "Osgood Schlatter's" and more serious conditions do exist so it is essential that you consult your physiotherapist to correctly diagnose and manage your pain.

# **Heel Pain in Kids / Severs Disease**

Also Known as Calcaneal Apophysitis, Sever's Disease is an extremely common cause of heel pain, particuarly in the young and physically active, who are still growing. It is characterised by pain during and after sport in and around the heel both at the back and sometimes the sides and bottom.

Until you stop growing, growth plates do not close. Some take longer to close than others. The heel and knee are probably the most common areas for this

Kids and adolescent's bones typic faster than the muscles, tendon ligaments.

In Sever's, the achilles tendon which attaches into the back for the heel pulls on the bone creating movement in the growth plate, wh results in inflammation and pain i heel

It is most common in those who participate in activities involving running and jumping (football, basketball and athletics). It is most common between the ages of about 9 and 14 and in most cases very easily managed.

#### **Contributing Factors**

- Poor footwear unsupportive
- Overpronation (excessive rolling in) increase the stretch and pull on the achilles and hence creates more movement in the growth plate
- Age most commonly between ages 9 and 14
- Rapid growth spurts
- Weak calves
- Tight calves


#### **Treatment:**

Treatment will vary depending on the severity and the persons

individual pain levels. It can involve:

- Footwear changes / advice
- Activity Modification (In most cases complete rest is not needed)
- Stretching / Icing Gentle stretching of the calf muscles prescribed by your podiatrist
- Orthotics to control the overpronation and reduce tension on the achilles or lifts under the heel.
