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

on trees which force people to duck or use the nature strip or in some cases the road. It is selfish and dangerous and in most cases idleness, that inconvenience walkers and the local 'postie'. It is the householder's responsibility to ensure that the footpath is not obstructed, so I urge all residents to have a look at the footpath outside their property (even if they are only renting) and get out the secateurs or hedgetrimmer and cut back offending growth.

Back in 1993 plans to extend the Stud Park Shopping Centre were approved by Council, increasing the leasable floor space by 9,000 sq.m and reducing the car parking ratio from 8 to 6 spaces per 100 sq.m.of floor space. Mitre 10 was built (now Sams), but the link from what is now Woolworths to the south



end of the centre never materialised. With the benefit of hindsight and the current car parking volume perhaps it

was just as well. Then of course there was the ING plan to put parking underground and expand the shopping area at the South and North end, which didn't come to fruition after the property was sold to Lend Lease. Today the Centre needs to expand, as customers are going to other centres where the variety and competetiveness of stores is much greater. I dare say the current owners are well aware of the situation, but action is required sooner rather than later to curtail the drain. What do our readers think?

On a positive note, this issue of the RLCN is number 350, another landmark for our community newspaper. 1981 seems a long long time ago. Inside this month we welcome the Australian Air League and congratulate Jean and Keith Hardy on their 70th wedding anniversary, Eildon Park Cricket Club on their 25th birthday and all the recipients in the recent Victoria Day Awards.

Knox initiates Seedlings project

Seedlings, a pilot led by Knox and funded by the State Government and partner local councils, offers opportunities for young children to become more aware of their natural environment and sustainable living.

Parliamentary Secretary for the Environment, Mr Brad Battin says, "The Seedlings program gives children a first-hand insight into nature at work and is designed to respond to the way children learn in their early years, through play, exploration and experience."

Knox Council Mayor Councillor Karin Orpen, says "We know how important waste, water and energy systems are, so it's really lovely to see a program that can excite our children and grandchildren about the importance of sustainability."

Seedlings is being piloted for ****** 12 months from July 2013, in 60 early childhood services across the local government areas including Knox. Participating services include maternal and child health, playgroups, family day care, childcare, preschools and integrated services.

Seedlings is funded by the Victorian Government's Victorian Sustainability and Adaptation Partnership (formerly known as the Sustainability Accord).

Knox Community Newspapers

Recently six editors of volunteer-run community papers in Knox met for a lunch hosted by Ferntree Gully News. This was a first for Knox and we plan to continue occasional meetings.

Not everyone is aware that there are in Knox six volunteer community papers with a total circulation over 55,000 copies, around the same number as that of households in the municipality.

The papers are, in order of years of publication: The Rowville-Lysterfield Community News in existence for 31 years, The Boronia-Basin Community News, The Foothills (formerly Upper Gully News), The Studfield-Wantirna Community News, Ferntree Gully News and most recently, The Bayswater Buzz. All are community owned, three as independent incorporated bodies, two The Foothills and Gully News are published by community houses. The Bayswater Buzz is auspiced by a partnership of Knox Community Health and Interchange. All the papers are financed largely by advertising, often from small businesses who understand the importance of offering their services in a strong community.

The two oldest papers are published monthly, three are bimonthly and The Buzz is quarterly. Each paper is produced and distributed by big teams of volunteers, many of whom put in long years of service.

Each paper, while quite individual in style and content, has as its vision and goal to strengthen and connect community in their locality. The Mayor of Knox, Karin Orpen said at a gathering of volunteers of Gully News earlier this year: 'These papers are like gold in our community.' The editors are hoping that by sharing their challenges and opportunities, their newspapers can continue to fulfil their role.



I knew the next year, 1985, was not going to start well.

We had submitted our prediction of school population and therefore staffing and accommodation needs in November and the Education Department had disagreed with our prediction of rising pupil numbers, their answer being that Rowville's numbers would decline

As a warning of things to come, I had a call from security in early January telling me there had been forty-six windows smashed at the school by marauding vandals, so the clean-up and repairs had to be carried out before the holidays ended.

A fortnight before school was to begin, I started to ring Staffing Branch to try to convince them of the accuracy of my figures, but I met with only an engaged signal every time I rang. I phoned many times daily with the same result, so that, when we started school, we were three teachers short and classes had to be held in the General Purpose room and at the end of the corridor.

The task of phoning Staffing was passed to Jeanette, our

school secretary, with no better result than mine. It is a mighty coincidence to have phoned so many times and the phones to be engaged every time. By the third day we had reached crisis point, so at ten o'clock I departed for Rialto Towers, the central location of the bureaucracy of the Education Department.

On arrival, I identified myself and my purpose. I was told to wait, and at 3.30.pm. I was ushered in to the bureaucratic presence where, contrary to what could be expected, I remained calm and collected and outlined my case, after which I was given the soft shoe shuffle by the departmental representative. At the end of this, I pointed out to him that, should we have no satisfactory result by the end of the following week,

the next phone numbers I would ring would be the daily newspapers, and they would be given full details of the case and access to take photographs.

We were phoned the following Monday to be assured that three additional teachers would be at the school by Friday,

42% of fires in the home occur in the kitchen. Over the cooler months of the year, the likelihood of fire increases by 15-20%. Together we can help to reduce this and keep our community

Here are some simple tips to help reduce the risks:

Install a fire blanket and fire extinguisher properly and within easy reach of your cooktop in the kitchen and know how to use them. Both should be on the wall, not in a drawer.

Most of us know the importance of keeping our cooktops clean and free of any build-up caused by overflowing pots, however something that is often overlooked is the range hood that just about every house now has. Over the years there are layers of oil that are sucked into these range hoods every time we cook and unless they are removed regularly, can be a fire waiting to happen with an errant spark from the cooktop.

For those with gas cooktops or ovens, it is just as important to make sure they are serviced regularly, especially if you are

70 Years Of Wedded Bliss For Peppertree **Couple**

There has to be a secret to being happily married for 70 years doesn't there but not as far as Jean and Keith Hardy are concerned. "Get lots of fresh air and exercise is a start" they said, "but being happy, getting on with and enjoying each other's company and keeping busy" has been our recipe. Keith Hardy was the youngest of 8 siblings (4 brothers and 3 sisters) when he was born in 1919 in Preston. His father worked for the railways, which resulted in the family moving around quite a bit, including time in East Gippsland, Box Hill, Yannathan (Gippsland again) and Benalla. He started his schooling in Box Hill before completing his studies in Yannathan. It was no surprise when he went to work at the Spencer Street railway yards in 1936, as an apprentice lamp maker

Jean MacDonald Scott was born in Hawthorn in 1921 and was the eldest of four (2 brothers and a sister) children. Her father was a butcher in Mont Albert and the family grew up in Surrey Hills. After completing her schooling, Jean went to Metropolitan Business College, where she learnt shorthand and typing. On graduation she gained employment in the Victorian Titles Office, searching through mountains of paperwork to find the necessary records.

"We first met at the Victoria Hall in Carlton, where there was a regular 50/50 dance (half old time and half modern)", said Jean, "With an entry fee of 2/-" added Keith.. With the Second World War showing no signs of ending, the couple married in 1943 at the Presbyterian Church in Kew and honeymooned

in the Grampians. "We were able to take advantage of special fares on the train of course!" said Keith. Their first house was in Rose Street, Surrey Hills, then they lived above a grocers store in Mont Albert for 6 years, before buying a block of land for £60 and building their first house in Heathmont. Keith took two years to build the fibro house that he saw in a Hardie design magazine and the family lived there for 24 years. Keith realised that making and maintaining gas lights in trains had no future and as he had worked alongside sheet metalworkers and plumbers at the railway yards at Spotswood, he went to night school and learnt his trade as a plumber.

Jenny and Grant, their two children, attended Tintern Girls School and Trinity College. They followed similar career paths, Jenny as an SEC home service advisor and Grant working in catering and hotel management. Jean and Keith have 5 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

In 1945 Keith started his own business and struggled to begin with, as money was tight everywhere and chasing money for jobs that had been done was a part of life. He went on to employ 12 people at one time before retiring in 1986. They purchased a holiday house in Blairgowrie, which the family enjoyed as much as possible despite the sometimes unsociable hours attached to being 'a plumber on call'. Keith also recalled "I bought one of the first Holden Utes and had to wait twelve months for delivery".

Keith belonged to a Drum & Fife band in his youth, where he played the flute, which, "I lost on the train" he recalled. Whilst at Spotswood, he was a member of their Mouth Organ band. Jean, like many girls, enjoyed ballet and dance and was accomplished enough to appear on a number of City stages. Together they belonged to the 1812 Theatre Company but it was their membership at the Ringwood Athletics Club, where Jean was their first Secretary, that opened up the world to them. They were at the forefront of organising tickets for the 1972 Munich Olympics for members and from then until the Commonwealth Games in 1990, they went to every Olympic and Commonwealth Games. As a result they have visited Russia twice, Scandinavia, UK, Canada, Alaska,




China and Japan.

"We have met many, many wonderful people in our lives, none more so than the families that were members of the Heathmont Advancement League, who together built the local kindergarten".

They moved to Kew and then Croydon before coming to Peppertree Hill in 1996 where their garden is a testament to their love of gardening. Progress on Wellington Village Post Office

I am pleased to report that progress is being made on getting additional postal services at Wellington Village.

Local residents and traders have been voicing their desire for a Wellington Village post office for some time. They make a clear case. The nearest post office, Stud Park, is often very busy. Lysterfield and the east side of Rowville have been growing rapidly in population in recent years and Wellington Village itself is now a substantial destination in its own right.

Over the last 18 months, I have been negotiating with Senior Executives at Australia Post to see if we can achieve this community objective.

The issue is not straightforward, as existing licence agreements at other postal outlets impact on developments elsewhere including at Wellington Village. Moreover, with the decline of mail sent, Australia Post is under pressure to reduce its retail footprint, not expand it.

However, we believe that we have made a breakthrough. We have been negotiating with Australia Post to partner with Bendigo Bank. The plan is for the Australia Post

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

Understanding Dry Needling



Dry Needling is a form of treatment which has increased in popularity with Myotherapists and Physiotherapists in the past 5-10 years. It is a technique whereby the use of a fine

solid needle (acupuncture needle) is inserted into the skin and/or muscle tissue to allow a twitch response and/or increase of blood flow to the area which therefore decreases Trigger Points, or more commonly known as "knots" in the muscle tissue.

The difference between Dry Needling and Acupuncture is simply that Dry Needling is much more specific in its selection and search for Trigger Points relevant to the client's dysfunction or condition, as interpreted by an extensive assessment and diagnostic protocols. Acupuncture on the other hand is based on the principles of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM), including stimulating the movement or flow of Chi through a selection of local and distal points found on acupuncture meridians. Chinese medicine believes that pain or poor function of the body occurs when Chi is blocked.

Dry Needling has been found to extensively treat conditions (in conjunction with massage, taping, exercises/ stretches and advice/education) including headaches/ migraines, stiff&painful necks, TMJ dysfunction, Chronic overuse syndromes- tendonitis, RSI, tennis/golfer's elbow, carpal tunnel, acute/chronic back pain, 'sciatica', knee, leg & foot pain, shin splints, patella tracking dysfunction, runner's knee, ankle sprains and postural issues causing increased pressure on associated soft tissue structures.

Headache



Movement Essential for Brain Development.

Childhood developmental delay and behavioural problems are a serious issue within our community, with 10.9% of Rowville and 6% of Lysterfield first graders rated by the Australian Government's Early Development Index as "developmentally vulnerable".

Developmental delay is a complex problem as the child is unable to communicate any issues, so it relies on those in close contact to identify where the child's progress may not adhere to the developmental milestones specified for various ages, across the areas of movement, language, memory and socialisation.

It had been thought that areas of the brain that controlled cognitive function (thinking), were separate from areas that controlled motor function (movement). New research is now confirming that the cerebellum, a part of the brain that was just thought to be involved in fine tuning movement, is now being recognized to be just as important in establishing cognitive and emotional behaviours.

What puts this into context even more is that the size of our ancestors' brains increased from less than 500cc over six million years ago to our current size of 1400cc due to our progression to walking upright. This requires greater input from receptors, mostly located within our spinal muscles, to communicate with the motor control centre within our brain to defy the effects of gravity. It was this increased size and capacity that then allowed for our cognitive development.

What started changing about 60 years ago with the widespread introduction of motor vehicles and television, has now become more firmly entrenched in the last 20 years with computer usage and the internet. We have stopped moving to the degree that we need to and it is now impacting on the development of our children.

It may seem cute to have young children learning to use smart phones and tablets, but the longer term benefit will come from active play where they are moving their spine. Dr Frank Whelan

Cleaning your Pets Teeth

Dental disease is one of the most common ailments seen by vets. It presents as one or more of the following: gingivitis (inflammation of the gums), tartar accumulation (a combination of food, saliva, bacteria and hair) and tooth enamel damage. The build up of tartar (brown-green material) on teeth and under the gum line will cause pain and infection. If left unchecked the infection can spread to surrounding bone and enter the blood stream causing general health deterioration.

There are a number of signs which should alert you to the possibility of dental disease or other mouth problems being present. Your pet may show less interest in food, or approach the food bowl but be reluctant to eat. It may chew with obvious caution or discomfort, drop food from the mouth, or may swallow with difficulty. Dribbling may be seen, possibly with blood and there may be an unpleasant odour to the breath. In some cases pets will paw at their mouths or shake their heads. Reluctance to eat may lead to weight loss.

If your pet is showing any of these signs it should be checked by your vet.

The first stage of cleaning is to remove any thick, heavy tartar build up, then a hand scaler is used to remove any finer particles of tartar from the tooth. Next is the most critical stage, a curette is used to clean any tartar, hair or debris under the gumline. It is this material under the gum-line, which leads to progression of dental disease and all of its associated health risks.

Once the hand cleaning is completed an ultrasonic scaling machine similar to the one used by your dentist is used to finish cleaning the exposed tooth surface, followed by a polish. After the teeth are cleaned, any requiring removal are extracted. Pets are usually given antibiotics by injection. A check up will be required if any teeth have been extracted to ensure that gums are healing well.

How Do I Keep My Pet's Teeth Clean?



Foods that are chewy will provide friction at the gumline physically removing plaque before it mineralises and hardens

For dogs this means raw, never cooked, marrowbones such as lamb shanks, beef shins or even brisket flaps. Smaller dogs can be fed raw chicken wings or legs. In addition any tough cuts of meat cut into long strips or larger will provide dental exercise. Raw hide chews and specially prepared dental "treats" are also effective removers of plaque.

For cats, raw chicken wings or necks are very effective and strips or chunks of tough, raw meat will help keep the tartar from their teeth. There are some special dental "treats" as well. As with dogs some form of dental workout should be done at least twice weekly.

Tooth Brushing


Using a brush to clean your pet's teeth is effective but pet only toothpastes must be used. Consult your vet about brush options.

Dry food will reduce the amount of tartar build up but a special dental diet "Hills t/d" has recently become available. The biscuits are a structured mesh, which act like a brush, cleaning the teeth as the pet eats. It can be fed as a fully balanced diet and sole food source and is available for cats, small dogs and medium to large dogs.

Greencross Vets nationwide are offering free dental checkups for pets until the end of August, to show pet owners really simple ways they can take care of their pet's teeth at home. You may even see a tooth fairy during your visit!! Michelle Bierman




Pyjama Yoga For Kids

Knox Home Garden Club

If you're not a lover of the cold weather, spare a thought for your garden. There are sure to be some plants not enjoying the chilly weather and frosty nights. Plants that are susceptible to frost damage can be protected by covering with cloth or plastic at night, but remember to remove the covers the next morning or the plants will expire in the sunshine. Potted tropical plants and any others that are frost tender, can be moved under cover or to a more protected position. Any that are too heavy to move or are planted in the garden can be covered as above or sprayed with a product that gives some frost protection. Remember that your pot plants require much less watering in the colder months.

There are many varieties of narcissus in bloom now and they make a colourful display. Many bulbs can be left in the ground for several years. When flowering is finished, give them some fertiliser and no matter how untidy they look, do not remove the leaves until they have completely yellowed.

If weeds have launched a take-over bid of your lawn, now is the time to attack them. Broad-leafed weeds, eg: dandelions, clover, thistles, daisies, etc; can be sprayed or spotted with a selective herbicide. A lawn weed and feed preparation is also an easy way to, well, weed and feed your lawn at the same time. Or you can just feed your lawn in late August. If your lawn has become compacted, aerate by pushing a fork deeply into the soil, or hire a powered aerator.

A lot of pruning takes place in winter. Take care, just because a tree or shrub is leafless, it doesn't mean that it is time to prune it. Always make sure that you prune at the right time for your plant and for the right reasons. It's not the correct time to prune spring bloomers and if you have to continually prune something to keep it in the space allocated for it, it's not in the right spot. Rose pruning should be completed by now, and get those bare rooted plants in before the weather warms up.

Council Minutes June 25th Meeting

Here is a brief summary of items affecting the Rowville-Lysterfield area.

Item 5.2 Ward Issues

Councillor Pearce (Taylor Ward)

• Councillor Pearce advised that stage 2 of construction work at Emerson Place Reserve had commenced noting that this would further enhance the quality of open space to this part of Rowville.

Councillor Seymour (Tirhatuan Ward)

- Councillor Seymour advised that she had recently met with local churches with a view to identifying immediate issues of concern for the community. Alcohol and gambling across the Rowville area were identified as a key concern.
- Councillor Seymour raised an issue of concern in relation to the condition and safety of the netball courts at the Rowville Community Centre and noted that the responsible club had applied for a community grant to address the problem.

Councillor Holland (Friberg Ward)

 Councillor Holland advised that he recently attended the Waterford Park Community Advisory Committee to discuss and work through resolving a number of issues including complaints regarding the recently installed lights at the Knox BMX Club. Councillor Holland advised there would be an ongoing relationship with the Committee.

Item 9.3 Skate Petition – Emerson Place

A report was presented which responds to a petition tabled at 26 March 2013 Ordinary Council meeting and an additional petition tabled at 28 May 2013 Ordinary Council meeting which requests that Council investigate the feasibility of a Skate Park at Emerson Place Reserve. The report provides details of the development of Council's Skate and BMX Plan and recommends that Council maintains its current policy position on the provision of skate facilities in the municipality.

Council resolved to:

- 1. Note this report responding to two petitions presented to Council relating to investigating "the feasibility of a Skate Park at Emerson Place Rowville next to Wellington Village Shopping Centre to provide an activity space for young people in the local area and beyond" which affirms Council's current policy on the provision of a centralised, regional Skate and BMX facility rather than smaller local facilities.
- 2. Note that the current landscape improvement project at Emerson Place Reserve as approved in the 2012-13 budget will include some skateable features.
- 3. Inform the lead petitioners of Council's response.
- 4. Refer to the 2013/14 mid year budget review consideration of resources to undertake a strategic review of Council's Skate and BMX Plan.
